The office of the Information and Privacy Coordinator has received your 25 April 2006 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for **an article in the *Studies in Intelligence* publication focusing on CIA intelligence officers Judge John T. Downey and Mr. Richard Fecteau.** We have assigned your request the reference number above. Please use this number when corresponding so that we can identify it easily.

We accept your request and will process it according to the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552, as amended, and the CIA Information Act, 50 U.S.C. § 431. We will search for the cited CIA-originated record existing through the date of this acceptance letter.

The large number of FOIA requests CIA receives has created unavoidable delays making it unlikely that we can respond within the 20 working days the FOIA requires. You have the right to consider our honest appraisal as a denial of your request and you may appeal to the Agency Release Panel. A more practical approach would permit us to continue processing your request and respond to you as soon as we can. You will retain your appeal rights and, once you receive the results of our search, can appeal at that time if you wish. We will proceed on that basis unless you object.

For your information, the FOIA authorizes federal agencies to collect fees for records services. You will note on the enclosed fee schedule that we charge search fees, including computer time where indices are computerized, and copying costs for releasable documents. In accordance with Section (a) of the schedule, search fees are assessable even if no records are found or, if found, we determine that they are not releasable. This means you would be charged even if our search results are negative or if we determine that no information is releasable under the FOIA.



Based upon the information provided in your letter, we determined that your request would fall into the "all other" fee category, which means that you would be required to pay charges which recover the cost of searching for and reproducing responsive records (if any) beyond the first 100 pages of reproduction and the first two hours of search time, which are furnished without charge. Copying costs are assessed at the rate of ten cents per page.

However, since we believe that fees will be minimal, as an act of administrative discretion, no fees will be charged in this instance.



This acknowledges receipt of your 31 December 1999 letter requesting records under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). Specifically, your request is for records pertaining to the following:

“the May 1999 bombing of the Chinese Embassy in Belgrade, Yugoslavia.”

For identification purposes we have assigned your request the number referenced above. Please refer to this number in future correspondence.

We have accepted your request; it will be processed in accordance with the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552, as amended, and the CIA Information Act, 50 U.S.C. § 431. Our search will be for documents in existence as of and through the date of this acceptance letter.

With respect to your request for a fee waiver, we have reviewed your request and have determined that the information you seek from Agency files would contribute significantly to the public understanding of the operations and activities of the United States Government. Therefore, your request for a fee waiver is granted.

The heavy volume of FOIA requests received by the Agency has created delays in processing. Since we cannot respond within the 20 working days stipulated by the Act, you have the right to consider this as a denial and may appeal to the Agency Release Panel. It would seem more reasonable, however,

to have us continue processing your request and respond as soon as we can. You can appeal any denial of records at that time. Unless we hear from you otherwise, we will assume that you agree, and we will proceed on this basis.

This is in reference to your 4 December 2000 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request regarding the bombing of the Chinese Embassy in Belgrade during the crisis in Kosovo. Specifically, we are responding to your voice message of 13 December 2001, in which you requested the status of your request. We attempted to phone you several times at the phone number our administrative assistant transcribed from your message, (910) 803-9310, but were unable to complete the call.

As you may recall, our initial acceptance letter of 15 December 2000 advised you that we were already processing a search on this subject for another requester, and that you would receive the same CIA-originated records, if any are released, once that request has been completed.

At this time, all of the Agency components involved in processing that previous request have completed their searches with the exception of one. This remaining component, unfortunately, is one that is coping with a bulk of this agency's workload. As a matter of policy, we process all requests on a first-in, first-out basis within the components searched, which we believe to be the most equitable for all requesters. Your patience and understanding while we process this request will be greatly appreciated. Please be assured that we will respond promptly when this request has been completed.

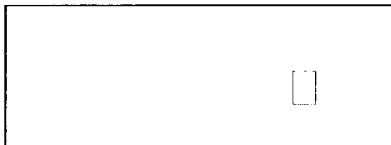

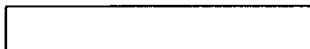

This acknowledges receipt, on 2 April 2002, of your 26 February 2002 letter requesting records under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). Specifically, your request is for records pertaining to:

**the bombing of the Chinese Embassy in Belgrade in 1999
(stated as 1988 in your letter).**

For identification purposes we have assigned your request the number referenced above. Please refer to this number in future correspondence.

As you may know, the discovery of anthrax in a letter mailed to the United States Senate on 15 October 2001 led to a series of escalating safety concerns about opening, handling, and even being in the proximity of mail, especially in government offices in Washington, D.C. These concerns, in turn, led to disruptions in, and then total curtailment of, mail delivery service, to include Freedom of Information Act-related correspondence, at many federal agencies, including the Central Intelligence Agency.

Under such extraordinary circumstances, the administration of the Freedom of Information Act has inevitably been delayed at all affected federal agencies. As a matter of both common sense and legal precedent, when mail delivery is delayed, so is the commencement of the process of FOIA administration, regardless of the time at which a FOIA request is placed into the mail by the requester or postmarked thereafter. Simply put, the FOIA process cannot begin until the personnel of an agency FOIA office are able to open any belatedly delivered item of mail.

On receipt of your letter, we initiated processing, and have determined that we received an earlier FOIA request for records on the same subject as yours. If you wish, we will send you the same CIA-originated records, if any are located, and deemed to be releasable, once that request has been completed. Your cost for copies of any released documents would be ten cents per page. We note, however, that you are requesting these records in connection with a paper you are writing. As we surmise that you most likely have a deadline in connection with this paper, we must point out that we cannot estimate how long it may take to complete the original request on which our response to you would be based.

If you wish to receive any documents that *may* be located and released in connection with the aforementioned case, please so advise us by return letter within 45 days from the date of this letter. If you do not respond to us within that time, we will assume you are no longer interested, and will cancel your request. For your convenience, you may wish to fax your response to us at (703) 613-3007.

We regret we are unable to be more helpful at this time.
